Routes to employment













Undergraduate

- No salary cost to the employer.
- Employer will need to provide placement.
- Places enabled by employer and university capacity.

Talent pool

- Local school and college students.
- Bridging or access programme participants.
- Mature students.
- Armed forces community.

(NOTE: Art, music and dramatherapy are only available to study as a postgraduate course)



Route time: minimum of three years

Postgraduate

- No salary cost to the employer.
- Employer will need to provide placement.
- Places enabled by employer and university capacity.

Talent pool

 Graduates in relevant subjects wishing to qualify as an AHP.



Degree apprenticeships

- Available at both level 6 (equivalent to BSc entry) and level 7 (equivalent to MSc entry).
- Salary and any additional training or backfill costs are to be covered by the employer.
- The apprenticeship levy can be used to pay for training costs.

Talent pool

- support worker workforce or other healthcare professionals
- bridging or access programme participants
- assistant practitioners
- lower level apprentices



Route time: typically four years

Return to practice

- Individuals who left AHP profession can return to practice through <u>HEE's return to practice programme.</u>
- Funding and supervised practice placements are available to enable individuals to return to the register.

Talent pool

• Those previously registered as an AHP professional and choosing to return.



Route time: up to a year

Trained overseas

- Individuals trained overseas that can directly apply to the relevant regulator register.
- Cost to the employer could include sponsorship, pastoral support or visa costs.
- Advantages of accessing a wider talent pool and diversifying the workforce.



Registered AHP professionals from non-UK countries.

Route time: up to six months



Entry requirements vary between higher education institutions for undergraduate and postgraduate training and must follow UK regulating bodies <u>Health and Care Professionals Council</u> (HCPC) or <u>General Osteopathic Council</u> (GOsC) educational standards.
